Hospital Outreach Program

Receives Grant Support from the Disney VoluntEARS Community Fund

DSAOC is grateful for the support we have received from Disney VoluntEARS and the Disney VoluntEARS Community Fund over the years. Their most recent \$5,000 grant supports our hospital outreach efforts.

The Hospital Outreach Program is led by a committee of dedicated volunteers who outreach to hospitals in Orange County and surrounding areas. The committee provides resources and informational materials about DSAOC and Down syndrome, so hospital social workers and other medical professionals are better prepared to deliver the diagnosis and/or offer support when a baby with Down syndrome is born in their hospital.

Research has shown that little progress has been made in physicians' delivery of diagnoses of Down syndrome, often resulting in inaccurate information to expectant and new parents where only the challenges of raising a child with Down syndrome are presented, rather than the positive aspects of how people with Down syndrome enrich our lives and communities. The committee's goal is to ensure accurate and up-to-date information is available to families in the hospital.

Our 2010-2011 Hospital Outreach Committee is fourteen members strong, up from its original seven members. The additional volunteer manpower has allowed us to reach out to five additional hospitals.

Michele Smith, mother of ten-year-old bike camper Dylan, shared

that her son had been discouraged for years watching his older sister Alyssa zip around on a two wheel bike, while he tried to catch up on his training wheels.

On the last day of bike camp, Dylan shed the training wheels and began riding on two wheels. "It was awesome to see Dylan smiling, riding around and waving to all the bike camp staff," said Michele.



As Dylan rode away on two wheels, he could be heard shouting, "Look at me!"

For three years,
DSAOC and United
Cerebral Palsy of Orange
County (UCP) have made
this bike camp possible.
The one week camp accommodates 40 individuals with disabilities.
Demand for the camp is

high. Campers are selected through a lottery system and there's been a waiting list every year. DSAOC and UCP are interested in growing the program to two weeks in the future to serve up to 80 campers. CHOC Children's Down Syndrome Program Update

The CHOC Children's Down Syndrome Program is nearing its one year anniversary of serving our families. This program has fulfilled an important need for our community, and this alliance between CHOC Children's and DSAOC has proven to be an invaluable resource.

Since opening last October, the clinic has evaluated 78 children with Down syndrome. The leading primary referral indication has been general assessment, followed by behavioral, neurological, endocrine, dental, orthopedic, gastrointestinal and urological issues. Specialty referrals have been made in more than half of the patients and included the specialties of ophthalmology, neurology, orthopedics, audiology, psychiatry, occupational therapy, endocrinology, urology and genetic counseling.

Community support continues to be essential to this effort. Expansion will be necessary to meet the growing list of children waiting to be assessed or needing second opinions regarding their medical issues. 
